Pastor's Notes


One of our UCC sister churches, Calvary Memorial United Church of Christ in Wauwatosa celebrated their final worship service on Sunday, November 24th. I've been thinking about the church and what it felt like for them to make this decision. As often happens with endings, it came earlier than expected. They had anticipated closing their doors sometime in 2020 but they unexpectedly received an offer on their building and had to move up the time of the final worship service.

I wonder if they hoped for a last minute reprieve of some kind – either grant money or a few new families to join and want to participate in the mission of the church. I wonder if it reminded them of other deaths they had experienced. I wonder how they determined where they would worship next and if this ending would offer depth to their spiritual lives.

This Sunday we enter the Advent season, a time of waiting and preparation. During the darkest time of the year, we prepare and wait. Bernard of Clairvaux (d. 1153) said that we wait for the physical presence of Jesus to come again. We wait for Christ to be born in our hearts daily, and we wait for Jesus' glory at the end of time. Whichever perspective speaks most clearly to us, it is a time of waiting for Christ to bring light to the darkness. Our faith teaches us that the congregants of Calvary Memorial United Church of Christ will have light to brighten their respective journeys even as we pray for them in this time of loss.

As we share Advent devotions together, I trust that the light of Christmas will also lead us forward. I have appreciated the enthusiasm, creativity and joy of this congregation as we have walked together this fall. I have now been here a year and understand the church better, but it feels good to be on solid ground. May we be good stewards of the mission we have been given.



Minutes from UCC Church Council November 11, 2019

 - 3. Amendment of the minutes:

Julie changed implication that money was set aside to make decisions about new windows, carpet, pews, etc. It should have only been discussed as what the options were based on the quotes that Tracy received.

Tracy moved to approve minutes as amended, Connie Wiersma seconded, passed

- 4. Pastor's report: (as submitted by Lori by paper)
 - a. Pastoral care (15 visits)
 - b. Worship

- ii. Advertisement starting for Community Thanksgiving Eve Worship
 - c. Administrative:
- . Larry Beck would like to put on pancake breakfast at 9:00 am morning of children's Christmas program
- Stewardship thanked for their efforts in 2019. We should reflect on whether or not materials are necessary for this endeavor next year.

- iii. MailChimp for weekly announcements? (Lukas likes it, more secure and colored)
- iv. For this Thanksgiving, Kathleen will be working Tuesday and Wednesday only
 - v. Blue advent candles ordered
 - 5. New Business:
 - a. Nominating committee
 - i. Connie Wiersma and Julie Norland will be on the committee
 - ii. Proposal: January 26th 2020 be Annual Meeting date
 - 1. Moved by Tracy Tronnes and seconded by Connie Wiersma, passed.
 - 2. Nothing decided about whether there would be a potluck or not.

6. Old Business

- a. Budget team is set: Bruce, Holly Tracy, Todd Campbell and Eric Kim
 - i. Bruce says most pledge forms and Time and Talent sheets are in
 - b. Flooring vs. Windows...
- i. Information was gathered by carpet, window treatments and pew cushions. It was in this gathering of information that the windows were exposed as being in need of replacement. Tracy got quotes for just the lower level (a priority over the upper level). She got a quote for 21 Anderson window units totaling \$17,700 for materials only. This represents the best quality of windows we could get which offers the longest life with a 20-25 year warranty. People discussed that the windows (originally Anderson windows) are either from 1954 or 1979. Tracy will get two other quotes for lines that aren't as top of the line.
- ii. We will need to get quotes from an installer. Tracy thought about asking Dan Dillman for his thoughts on what installation might entail. Would it be possible to have it completed by January?
- iii. Any quote will be only an estimate due to some of the things that would come up when true measurements are known. Inserts would be less expensive if there isn't a need for custom measuring and would be "job-determined."
- Tracy suggests getting a contractor to be in charge of decisions before placing any order.
 - v. Julie reminds us that any expenditure over \$10,000 needs to be up for a congregation vote.
- vi. The four worst windows (East side Henry) could be done for as low as \$2633.

 This would be the cheaper inserts that are more readily available and may be a good way to start the process. Again, a contractor could be helpful in making decision with us to make sure they are right for the space.
- c. Julie thanks the Stewardship Committee for their work and hosting the breakfast on Sunday
 - 7. Team Reports
 - a. Trustees:

- i. Todd fixed the downspout by re-routing the water out of the way of walkway.
 - ii. Plastic has been put on most windows for energy efficiency.
- iii. Lukas called for an energy audit, but the call he received was not helpful in getting action on it.
- iv. The drinking water is considered safe, but still smells like chemicals or iron.Bottled water is an option if people are worried about using water from the tap.
 - v. Motion lights are being fixed and breaking in equal measure.
 - vi. Update on Memorial Fund
 - It was brought up that our Newsletter found its way to facebook. This brings up issues about confidentiality. Sometimes the minutes are attached to our newsletter and this maybe something to discuss further someday.
 - vii. Kim Jensen's keys were turned in by Lukas.
 - b. Treasurer:
 - i. Plate contributions are up
 - ii. Pledges and operational budget are on target for 2019
- iii. Questions arose about what we will need to do with a commitment we made to Lori regarding contributing to her pension. This will require that Tracy follow up on a very slow-moving application process with the company in charge of clergy pensions. She is on it and it is in the budget to provide to Lori.
 - c. Christian Ed:
 - Seasons of the Spirit will be used for the remainder of the Winter and through the Spring of 2020 assuming this can be purchased with the funds that remain in her budget.
 - ii. Christmas children's service is December 15th with practice on the 14th at 10:30
 - d. Deacons:
 - i. Communion and Hanging of the Greens is Dec 1st (9:00 am)
 - ii. Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve services...where to give ecumenical offerings?
 - Tracy makes motion that Thanksgiving Eve offering be given to
 Outreach to help with their meals they provide the community the next
 day. Connie seconded the above, passes.
 - 2. Christmas Eve offering will be as usual.
 - Blue Christmas is scheduled for the 18th of December. More discussion needed on specifics of the service.
- 8. Meeting adjourned at 8:01 after a motion by Connie Wiersma and seconded by Tracy Tronnes.
