My hope during this preparation time is that we practice kindness with each other. As simple as that sounds, it can also feel messy. Mary Oliver describes this well in her poem:

And anyway it's the same old story – a few people just trying one way or another to survive.

Mostly, I want to be kind. And nobody of course, is kind or mean for a simple reason.

And nobody gets out of it, having to swim through the fires to stay in this world.

My hope when we gather again in worship we discover we are an authentic community, deeply rooted in the teachings of Jesus with passion for mercy and justice.

- 2. Prayer by Pastor Lori
- 3. Approval of the November 9, 2020 minutes, moved by Tracy Tronnes, seconded by Bruce Morris
- 4. A way Forward ("The Tracy and Connie Show")
 - a. Connie shares that Lorraine from the association says we need to learn how to deal with conflict in order to move forward
 - b. Rev Cicneros proposes that we participate in a process working with people who are trained to be with our church. She believes we will benefit as individuals as well as a church body.
 - c. In her opinion our church needs a "Life-giving Way forward" out of the blowing out of the dust from the cracks that the church has had for a while.
 - d. The initial meeting will be free done by the Conflict Transformation Team, but if there is follow-up meetings we need, they will need to be paid for. Lombard Mennonite Peace Center sponsors it.
 - e. Tracy Tronnes moves, and seconded by Mary Lou that we make a connection with the Conflict Transformation Team

c. Administrative:

- ii. Asks 2 to 3 people to go through our processes and looking at the job descriptions of the committees and how decisions are made. Lori feels there are too many short-cuts in place that develop cracks in our communication process.

6. Old Business

- a. Stewardship drive is complete. Budget team is set: Bruce, Holly Tracy, and Todd Campbell have been meeting on email.
 - i. Bruce says most pledge forms and Time and Talent sheets are in. It isn't surprising we are down in pledges.

7. New Business:

- a. Annual Meeting: thoughts?
 - Mary Lou shares an idea that maybe share care teams (Deacons) could deliver the annual reports to members.
 - ii. Included in the reports delivery would have the minutes from last year as well as a ballot for people to mail back their votes for budget, new/old officers.
 - iii. Finalize the details at the January council meeting.
 - iv. Thinking to have the report together by January 12th, to be distributed to the church by the 23rd and the meeting to be held on January 31st, 2021 after church at 11:00 am via Zoom. There may a be limited number of people who will be allowed to attend that day if a member can't operate a Zoom call.
- b. Budget committee is putting together a budget that divides the year 2021 into two halves where one half of the year will look differently financially in those two halves. Bruce would like the church to be aware of the projected loss in pledges and obvious absence of plate. By dividing the year like this, the plate should be better when we are in person again.
