That Science cannot overtake
But Human Nature feels...

Even before the glory of the Resurrection, seeds of new life are being sown. Lent is a time to sift through and make plans. In agrarian terms, what will be plant this year? What will our fields look like? In church terms, what is God calling us to? What are our hopes and dreams? What work needs to be done for us to share the Good News?

To open the building and resume in person worship we need cross ventilation in the Sanctuary. This will come when the other side windows are completed. A Message from Our Moderator

Greetings,

We prayerfully hope that this pandemic is winding down and we can again safely be together in our sanctuary. This is a high priority for our Church leadership and we will continue to update you on this. We are looking at not only our physical health, but also the health and strength of our Church.

As we are in the midst of Lent we continue to reflect on our personal faith journey and the life of our Church. The Council is continuing to look at the priorities that we identified just prior to the onset of the pandemic: worship; mission and outreach; and pastoral care in the context of our stated beliefs. The Council has currently been working with representatives from our Association to help us with this Several Council members attended a meeting (via Zoom) of the Conflict Transformation Team who stressed the need to begin with our Core Values: those being our values, our priorities and our convictions. We will continue to explore this process throughout the coming weeks.

The life of the Church is continuing in many ways. Some examples of this are, that we continue to provide Church School materials to our children, we are holding a Wednesday night book study, our Church continues to help with the Meals on Wheels program, and our office has remained open. We have applied for a second PPP loan to help with expenses during this time. The PPP loan that we received last year has been forgiven and our hope is that if we receive a second loan, that too will eventually turn into a grant.

As we anticipate Easter, we will continue to provide meaningful worship via Facebook and hopefully be able to offer some in person options as the weather warms.

It's almost time for One Great Hour of Sharing! (OGHS)



CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING Monday Jan. 11, 2021

PRESENT: Connie Wiersma, Tracy Tronnes, Bruce Morris, Lynn Miller, Pastor Lori Powell and Mary Lou Behring.

Connie Wiersma called the meeting to order and Pastor Lori led us in devotion and prayer.

Minutes from the Dec. 14th meeting were reviewed. Tracy made a motion to approve the minutes and Mary Lou seconded it. Motion passed.

PASTORS REPORT: Lori handed out a print out of a pie chart showing the responsibilities of pastor/ congregation and the changes that have happened during the pandemic. Ash Wednesday and Lent were discussed. Lori will touch base with the Diaconate in regard to the Ash Wednesday service. A zoom book study was decided upon for our Lenten study. It will be on Wednesday nighst during lent. Starting on 2/24-3/31 at 6:30 p.m. The Book is Titled Love Is the Way, by Michael Curry. Lori will check with Kirsten Almo about the availability of the reading from the library.

OLD BUSINESS: The council went through the current membership list and figured out who would deliver the annual reports to members. Some will also be picked up and some will be mailed. There will be options available for the voting process to approve the minutes from last year, the committee reports and the annual budget. There is a possibility of another forgivable PPP loan, but Tracy has to check the specs to see if we will qualify.

DIACONATE: There will be a zoom meeting on Monday Feb. 8^{th at} 6:30 to discuss Ash Wednesday service.

TRUSTEES: The motion light at the fellowship entrance has been repaired. The boiler has been repaired and checked at little or no expense due to warranty. Bruce has been elected to head the trustees and Lynn as secretary again.

TREASUERS REPORT: Tracy reported a budget negative of \$16,000, but there was a donation the year before for windows of \$5000.

Mary Lou made a motion to adjourn, Tracy seconded it. Meeting adjourned.
