

UCC Featured Devotional: "The All-Important P.S. to John 3:16"

"For God so loved the world that God gave God's beloved Child, so that everyone who believes may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send their Child into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." – John 3:16-17 (NRSV)

This passage includes one of the most well-known verses in the Bible, John 3:16. "John 3:16" can be found on t-shirts, memes, bumper stickers, signs at sporting events, even on the eye-black of an NFL quarterback. John 3:16 is often used as a litmus test. If you believe in Jesus (which is code for "if you believe what I believe about Jesus"), then you will be saved from eternal damnation. If not, your ultimate destination is bleak. The verse is used and abused as a pretext for condemning people to hell.

I think the writer of John saw that coming as he first penned 3:16, so he included an addendum—a postscript—as a safeguard: "Indeed, God did not send their Child into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him" (John 3:17).

When John talks about the world being saved through Jesus, he's not envisioning a luxurious post-mortem retirement in the clouds for those who "accept Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior," a phrase which occurs exactly zero times in the Bible.

For John, salvation begins now by checking the impulse to condemn, and committing instead to the Jesus way of love, forgiveness, nonviolence, doing justice, showing mercy, walking humbly. In short, to love the world as God loves it.

Jesus did not come to condemn. For that, we should be eternally grateful. Jesus came to love and serve and thereby to save.

Prayer

World Lover, help me check the impulse to condemn others and to love as Jesus loves.

COVID-19 GUIDELINES




Updated March 2022

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES

February 14th, 2022 Meeting called to order by Connie Wiersma at 7:10 pm

- 1. Opened in prayer, the serenity prayer by Pastor Nordstrom
- 2. Approval of the January 11th minutes Tracy moves to approve, seconded by Kathleen, motion approved.
- 3. Pastor's report: Facebook recorded services going well and feels the response has been positive and increasing. Please refer to the agenda for the details.
- 4. Lenten Services:
 - *Ash Wednesday (March 2nd) and Maundy Thursday (April 14th), although they are not well-attended all feel they are important to continue. 6:30 pm will be start time.
- 5. Will we be starting Sunday school on the 13th of March? We will be involving Jill Sanderson, a frequent attender who is interested in getting this going.
 - *Some concerns will be Covid numbers still strong in Rock and Dane Counties
 - * Spring Break is Monday 28 to April 4thh
 - * Cross-ventilation could be a good thing for keeping Covid away.
 - * Maybe a trial run for this by offering a few weeks and get things going for the Fall
 - * Would putting together some more packets to send out to let the youth know we're thinking about them be a nice thing to do?
- 6. Confirmation is a bit up in the air...talked about offering it to the families to see if there's interest.
- 7. Adult Education Wednesday evenings on Zoom will be to talk about the book The Shack. People can pick them up and ask for our reserved copies of the book. Kathleen will look into being a hybrid model for disseminating the discussion points from the book discussion.

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- 8. Kathleen shares some ideas about special services...all about creating a more robust music program like Special Music Sundays or solo performances.
- * Thinks surveying the church to see what their likes are or having a listening session about what members and attenders would enjoy and get them to get excited about hearing good music!
 - * Ideas also were shared about Zooming the meeting.
- * March 13th for the listening session. Put the idea into the newsletter to get people thinking about what their answers
- * She reminds us that our organist, Josephine, shared the idea to bring recitals here.
- * Josephine may need a separate Gmail name through the church so people can communicate with her directly instead of through her personal email.
- .9. Kathleen also shares an idea like raising funds for different charities that we could donate to so that ECUCC gets their name on doing good things. Or to just get out and about doing good work in the community so people may want to be a part of our community. Kathleen suggests that we have a listening session for these ideas too.
- 10. CTT Committee sent a report entitled Leadership for Congregational Crossroads
 - *Where have we been, where we are and where are we going?
 - *Should involve the congregation in the decisions about where are church should be going.
 - *Discussed possible dates, evenings and after church.
 - *Talked about having it catered by the Campbell brothers across the street in order to get more people to attend.
 - *The purpose of the meetings would be to bring concerns, when they arise, to the right people and in the right way to solve the problem. We would also be looking to improve the communication process.
 - * Possible dates that Connie will give to the organizers Sunday May 15th 12:30 -3:30 and Thursday 19th 6-9 pm

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Reports:

Trustees— More windows have been ordered to finish the sanctuary. They will be arriving in phases. Bruce proposes that doors be added to the remodeling. Wonders if donations would come in stronger if they were going to certain projects that people feel passionate about? Eric Kim still willing to give substantial discount on labor. Kathleen can put something that Bruce writes up in the newsletter about it and buying them now will save on a coming soon building price hike on windows.

Treasurer—Needed to move some monies into account to pay bills. We are moving forward and nothing is coming as a surprise.
